Domestic Violence Awareness Month

October 2023

WHEREAS, Home should be a place of warmth, unconditional love, tranquility, and security, and for most of us, home and family can indeed be counted among our greatest blessings. Tragically, for many Americans, these are blessings that are tarnished by violence and fear; and

WHEREAS, Every 9 seconds a woman in the United States is assaulted by an intimate partner and an average of 3 women are murdered by intimate partners in the United States every day and a person experiencing strangulation in a relationship is 7 times more likely to be murdered by their partner and, according to the American Psychological Association, the presence of a gun in a domestic violence situation increases the risk of homicide by 500%; and

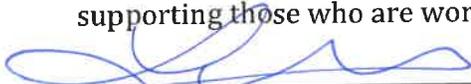
WHEREAS, According to the Bureau of Justice Statistics Crime Data Brief, Intimate Partner Violence, women accounted for 85% of the victims of intimate partner violence, men for approximately 15%; and

WHEREAS, Women and men are not the only targets; children, the elderly, family pets and responding law enforcement officers are counted among the victims and,

WHEREAS, According to the National Resource Center on Domestic Violence, approximately 23% of LGBTQ men and 50% of LGBTQ women experience abuse at the hands of their intimate partners; and

WHEREAS, Domestic Violence costs an estimated \$8.3 billion annually in medical care, mental health services, and lost productivity on the job. Women, men and children living with domestic violence suffer higher rates of physical injuries, chronic health problems, depression, PTSD, attempted suicide, substance abuse, behavior problems for children, and homelessness.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT, We, the Story County Board of Supervisors, do hereby proclaim October 2023 as Domestic Violence Awareness Month and urge our citizens to observe this month by becoming aware of the tragedy of domestic violence and supporting those who are working toward its end.

WHEREAS, the holiday known as Columbus Day commemorates the Italian Explorer Christopher Columbus and his voyages to the “New World” the beginning of the colonization of indigenous people that forever changed their identity, cultures and achievements; and

WHEREAS, numerous cities and state governments within the United States now recognize Columbus Day also as Indigenous Peoples’ Day in an effort to create a path of healing and reconciliation; and

WHEREAS, Story County recognizes that the Indigenous Peoples of the lands that would later become known as the Americas have occupied these lands since time immemorial; and

WHEREAS, Story County recognizes and values the many contributions made through Indigenous Peoples’ knowledge, labor, technology, science, philosophy, arts and the deep cultural contribution; and

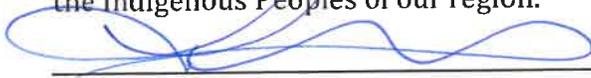
WHEREAS, Story County has a responsibility to oppose the systematic racism towards Indigenous People in the United States, which perpetuates high rates of poverty and income inequality, exacerbating disproportionate health, education, and social crises; and

WHEREAS, Story County promotes the closing of the equity gap for Indigenous Peoples through policies and practices that reflect the experiences of Indigenous Peoples, ensure greater access and opportunity, and honor our nation’s indigenous roots, history, and contributions; and

WHEREAS, Indigenous Peoples’ Day was first proposed in 1977 by a delegation of Native Nations to the United Nations sponsored International Conference on Discrimination Against Indigenous Populations in the Americas; and

WHEREAS, honoring the role of Columbus as a historical figure promotes values of intolerance and violence that are still common in today’s world and opposed to the values of the citizens of Story County;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT, We, the Story County Board of Supervisors, do hereby proclaim October 9, 2023 as Indigenous Peoples Day and we strongly support the proposition that Indigenous Peoples’ Day shall be an opportunity to celebrate the thriving cultures and values of the Indigenous Peoples of our region.

**Story County
Provider and Program Participation Agreement**

THIS AGREEMENT (the Agreement), entered into this First day of July, 2023 is by and between Story County and Central Iowa Juvenile Detention Center (Provider) The statements and intentions of the parties, to this Agreement, are as follows:

Story County is a governmental entity organized under the Code of Iowa, governed by the Board of Supervisors. Services identified in this Agreement are funded by Story County and administered by the General Assistance Department. Story County is interested in contracting with Provider to purchase Covered Services for the benefit of Story County Individuals.

Provider is licensed, certified and/or accredited under the laws of the State of Iowa to provide Covered Services. Provider is interested in contracting with Story County to provide Covered Services for the benefit of Story County Individuals.

In consideration of the premises and promises contained herein, it is mutually agreed by and between Story County and Provider as follows:

**SECTION 1
Definitions**

Assignment: The act of transferring to another all or part of one's property interest or rights.

Co-payment: The amount which may be charged to Story County Individual at the time services are rendered.

Story County Individual: A resident of the county who is eligible and authorized to receive funding as defined by the Story County Substance Abuse Services Funding Policy as approved by the Story County Board of Supervisors.

Covered Services: Services enumerated in the Story County Substance Abuse Services Funding Policy as approved by the Story County Board of Supervisors.

Subcontract: The act in which one party to the original contract enters into a contract with a third party to provide some or all of the services listed in the original contract.

**SECTION 2
Duties of Provider**

Section 2.1 Provision of Covered Services. Provider shall provide Covered Services to each Story County Individual who is authorized by the General Assistance Director or designee to receive such services to the extent designated in Attachment A, Service Definitions and Rates. Such services shall be rendered in compliance with applicable laws and regulations and the Story County Substance Abuse Services Funding Policy. Provider shall also provide Covered Services in a manner which: (a) documents the services provided, **in conformance with Federal (including the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act, HIPAA, if applicable), State and local**

laws and regulations, and (b) protects the confidentiality of the Story County Individual's medical records.

Section 2.2 Compliance with the Story County Substance Abuse Services Funding Policy.

Provider and its staff shall be bound by and provide Covered Services in compliance with the Story County Substance Abuse Services Funding Policy. Failure to comply with the Story County Substance Abuse Services Funding Policy may result in sanctions such as, but not limited to, the loss of reimbursement and/or termination of the Agreement.

Section 2.3 Authorization and Notification Requirements. All Covered Services provided to Story County Individuals by Provider must be authorized by the General Assistance Director or designee in accordance with the Story County Substance Abuse Services Funding Policy. The Story County Substance Abuse Services Funding Policy shall not diminish Provider's obligation to render Covered Services consistent with the applicable standard of care.

Section 2.4 Access to Books and Records. Unless otherwise required by applicable statutes or regulation, Provider shall allow Story County access to books and records, for purposes of appeals, utilization, grievance, claims payment review, individual medical records review or financial audits, during the term of this contract and seven (7) years following its termination. Provider shall provide records or copies of records as requested.

Section 2.5 Most Favored Rate. Story County shall receive the most favorable charge by the Provider. No Provider can charge another County more or less than the Provider County.

SECTION 3

Claims Submission and Payment

Section 3.1 Claims Submission. Provider agrees to submit all claims for reimbursement in accordance with the Story County's claims process.

Section 3.2 Claims Payment. Story County will make monthly payments to the Provider in accordance with the County's claims process.

Section 3.3 Compensation to Provider. Provider agrees to accept payment from Story County for Covered Services provided to Story County Individuals under this Agreement as payment in full, less any Co-payment or other amount which is due from Story County Individuals for such services. Compensation for Covered Services is included as Attachment A, Service Definitions and Rates.

SECTION 4

Relationship Between the Parties

Section 4.1 Relationship Between Story County and Provider. The relationship between Story County and Provider is solely that of independent contractor and nothing in this Agreement shall be construed or deemed to create any other relationship including one of employment, agency or joint venture. Provider shall maintain social security, workers compensation and all other employee benefits covering Provider's employees as required by law.

SECTION 5

Hold Harmless, Indemnification and Liability Insurance

Section 5.1 Provider Hold Harmless and Indemnification. Provider shall defend, hold harmless and indemnify Story County against any and all claims, liability, damages or judgments asserted against, imposed or incurred by Story County that arise out of acts or omission of Provider or Provider's employees, agents or representatives in the discharge of its responsibilities under this Agreement.

Section 5.2 Story County Hold Harmless and Indemnification. Story County shall defend, hold harmless and indemnify Provider against any and all claims, liability, damages or judgments asserted against, imposed or incurred by Provider that arise out of acts or omission of Story County or Story County employees, agents or representatives in the discharge of its responsibilities under this Agreement.

Section 5.3 Provider Liability Insurance. Provider shall procure and maintain, at the Provider's own expense professional liability insurance and comprehensive general and/or umbrella liability insurance. Evidence of insurance shall be provided at the time of execution of this Agreement and may be provided in the form of a certificate of insurance.

SECTION 6

Laws and Regulations

Section 6.1 Laws and Regulations. Provider warrants that it is, and during the term of this Agreement will continue to be, **operating in full compliance with all applicable federal (including the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act, HIPAA) and state laws.**

Section 6.2 Reports from State Authority or Agency. The Provider will be expected to comply fully with all rules and regulations imposed by a State licensing authority. All written or verbal communications or reports from a State authority or agency, including but not limited to summaries of inspection reports or complaints of abuse or neglect resulting in investigation(s), shall be provided to Story County immediately upon receipt of same by the Provider.

Section 6.3 Compliance with Civil Rights Laws. Provider agrees not to discriminate or differentiate in the treatment of any individual based on sex, race, color, age, religion, national origin or otherwise qualified handicapped individual. Provider agrees to ensure Covered Services are rendered to Story County Individuals in the same manner, and in accordance with the same standards and with the same availability, as offered to any other individual receiving services from Provider.

Section 6.4 Equal Opportunity Employer. Story County is an equal employment opportunity employer. Story County supports a policy which prohibits discrimination against any employee or applicant for employment on the basis of age, race, sex, color, national origin, religion, physical or mental disability, veteran or any other classification protected by law or ordinance. Provider agrees that it is in full compliance with Story County's Equal Employment Policy as expressed herein.

Section 6.5 Confidentiality of Records. Story County and Provider agree to maintain the confidentiality of all information regarding Covered Services provided to Story County Individuals under this Agreement in accordance with any applicable laws and regulations except as required by law or as ordered by a court of competent jurisdiction. Provider acknowledges that in receiving, storing, processing, or otherwise dealing with information from Story County about Individuals, it is fully bound by federal (including the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act, HIPAA, if applicable) and state laws and regulations governing the confidentiality of medical records and substance abuse services records.

SECTION 7 **Term and Termination**

Section 7.1 Term. The term of this Agreement shall be for a period of one (1) year, commencing on the date first above written, or until the end of the current fiscal year, whichever occurs first. The Agreement may auto renew for up to two additional one year terms, subject to termination with prior written notice 90 days before the renewal as identified in Section 7.2.

Section 7.2 Nonrenewal of Agreement. Either party may choose not to renew this agreement upon ninety (90) days written notice to the other party prior to the expiration of the contract.

Section 7.3 Termination of Agreement Without Cause. Either party may terminate this Agreement without cause upon ninety (90) days prior written notice of termination to the other party.

Section 7.4 Termination With Cause by Story County. Story County shall have the right to terminate this Agreement immediately by giving written notice to Provider upon the occurrence of any of the following events: (a) restriction, suspension or revocation of Provider's license, certification or accreditation; (b) Provider's loss of any liability insurance required under this Agreement; (c) a bankruptcy petition filed by the Provider, or (d) Provider's material breach of any of the terms or obligations of this Agreement.

Section 7.5 Termination With Cause by Provider. Provider shall have the right to terminate this Agreement immediately by giving written notice to Story County upon the occurrence of Story County's material breach of any of the terms or obligations of this Agreement.

Section 7.6 Information to Story County Individuals. Provider acknowledges the right of Story County to inform Story County Individuals of Provider's termination and agrees to cooperate with Story County in deciding on the form of such notification.

Section 7.7 Continuation of Services After Termination. Upon request by Story County, Provider shall continue to render Covered Services in accordance with this Agreement until Story County has transferred Story County Individuals to another provider or until such Story County Individual is discharged.

SECTION 8 **Amendments**

Section 8.1 Amendment. This Agreement may be amended at any time by the mutual written agreement of the parties. In addition, Story County may amend this Agreement upon sixty (60) days advance notice to Provider and if Provider does not provide written objection to Story County within the sixty (60) day period, then the amendment shall be effective at the expiration of the sixty (60) day period.

Section 8.2 Regulatory Amendment. Story County may also amend this Agreement to comply with applicable statutes and regulations and shall give written notice to Provider of such amendment and its effective date. Such amendment will not require sixty (60) days advance written notice.

SECTION 9

Other Terms and Conditions

Section 9.1 Non-Exclusivity. This Agreement does not confer upon the Provider any exclusive right to provide services to Story County Individuals in Provider's geographical area. Story County reserves the right to contract with other providers. The parties agree that Provider may continue to contract with other organizations.

Section 9.2 Assignment. Provider may not assign any of its rights and responsibilities under this Agreement to any person or entity without the prior written approval of Story County.

Section 9.3 Subcontracting. Provider may not subcontract any of its rights and responsibilities under this Agreement to any person or entity without prior notification to Story County.

Section 9.4 Entire Agreement. This Agreement and attachments attached hereto constitute the entire agreement between Story County and Provider, and supersedes or replaces any prior agreements between Story County and Provider relating to its subject matter.

Section 9.5 Rights of Provider and Story County. Provider agrees that Story County may use Provider's name, address, telephone number, description of Provider and Provider's care and specialty services in any promotional activities. Otherwise, Provider and Story County shall not use each other's name, symbol or service mark without prior written approval of the other party.

Section 9.6 Invalidity. If any term, provision or condition of this Agreement shall be determined invalid by a court of law, such invalidity shall in no way effect the validity of any other term, provision or condition of this Agreement, and the remainder of the Agreement shall survive in full force and effect unless to do so would substantially impair the rights and obligations of the parties to this Agreement.

Section 9.7 No Waiver. The waiver by either party of a breach or violation of any provisions of this Agreement shall not operate as or be construed to be a waiver of any subsequent breach.

Section 9.8 Notices to Story County. Any notice, request, demand, waiver, consent, approval or other communication to Story County which is required or permitted herein shall be in writing and shall be deemed given only if delivered personally, or sent by registered mail or certified mail, or by express mail courier service, postage prepaid, as follows:

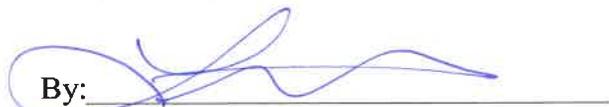

ANIMAL RESCUE SERVICE CONTRACT

This contract and Agreement is entered into by and between Story County, Iowa and the City of Zearing, Iowa pursuant to the authority, and by the procedures of Chapter 28E, Code of Iowa.

1. **Purpose:**
Under this contract, Story County shall provide said City with services of domestic animal rescue as set forth more specifically in succeeding paragraphs hereIn with the exception of 2(e) and (f). Story County will not provide service with regard to wild animals except as noted below in the Scope of Services, and in the sole discretion of Story County.

2. **Scope of services (pursuant to Story County Code of Ordinances):**
 - a. Transportation of animals impounded by the contracting city.
 - b. Shelter and board for the impounded animals.
 - c. Issuance of applicable impoundment charges on impounded animals pursuant to Story County Code of Ordinances.
 - d. Cat, dog, and other small domesticated animal adoption service for appropriately impounded animals.
 - e. Investigation and disposition of rabid, sick or injured animals.
 - f. Supervision of quarantine procedures and rabies testing.
 - g. Collection and impounding of City trapped cats.
 - h. Arrange for emergency veterinary care or provision of first-aid treatment.
 - i. Provision of humane euthanasia of unclaimed cats and dogs pursuant to Iowa Code 351.37.
 - j. Rescue of animals in unusual or emergency circumstances (i.e. flood waters, fire, etc., with permission from appropriate City Official).
 - k. One letter sent to resident of said City when requested by said City and only after prior attempts at resolution by City.

Any other animal control related problem may be dealt with at the Animal Control Officer's discretion.

The City understands that all service is subject to the Animal Control Officer's availability and discretion with the expressed approval of a City Official, except in emergencies.

3. Consideration: (Quarterly billing)

The City will pay Story County, Iowa, based on the following fee schedule:

(No trip charge will be assessed from 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., Monday – Friday)

- a. \$50.00 per officer involved, per trip between the hours of 3:00 p.m. and 8:00 a.m., Monday through Friday, all day Saturday, Sunday and holidays.
- b. \$25.00 per trip for investigations (regardless of whether or not an animal is detained), confining an animal, and other services as needed.
- c. \$6.50 per day up to a maximum of seven (7) days per unclaimed dog for boarding and transportation costs.
- d. \$5.50 per day up to a maximum of seven (7) days per unclaimed cat for boarding and transportation costs.
- e. \$5.50 per day up to a maximum of seven (7) days per unclaimed exotic animal for boarding and transportation costs.
- f. \$10.00 per day up to a maximum of seven (7) days per unclaimed head of livestock for boarding and transportation costs. Depending on animal size, if a trailer is needed to transport an animal, add an additional \$35.00.
- g. \$15.00 for euthanasia of each unclaimed or unwanted cat not held for seven (7) days, due to sickness, injury or rabies testing.
- h. \$25.00 for euthanasia of each unclaimed or unwanted dog not held for seven (7) days, due to sickness, injury or rabies testing.
- i. \$20.00 for euthanasia of each wild animal species such as opossum, raccoon, etc.
- j. \$5.00 per day for rental of cat box trap.
- k. \$8.00 per day for rental of dog box trap.
- l. \$10.00 per citation issued at the request of said City.
- m. \$10.00 handling/transportation charge for all domestic animals held less than seven (7) days.
- n. At the discretion of said City and Animal Control, an animal may be held and boarded for less than a minimum seven (7) days if the animal is:
Significantly sick or injured, ill-tempered or vicious, feral/wild (not adoptable, applicable to cats and dogs only), believed to have been exposed to a disease infectious to animals or humans.

4. Rescue and removal charges:

For any animal in unusual or emergency circumstances - \$50.00 per trip, per Animal Control Officer needed, and any other applicable fees (which may include, but are not limited to, Sheriff's Office invoices for service).

All diagnostic and/or quarantine costs shall be paid by the City.

5. Recording requirements:

In Accordance with Iowa Code Chapter 28E, a copy of this agreement shall be filed with the Secretary of State and recorded with the Story County Recorder.

6. Termination:

Either party may terminate this agreement without penalty at any time by giving written notice at least thirty (30) days before the effective date of such termination.

7. Effective date:

This agreement shall become effective upon formal passage and execution of the Board of Supervisors above named and upon filing of this agreement with the Secretary of State of Iowa.

8. Duration and term:

The initial term of this agreement shall be for a period of one year commencing on July 1, 2023, and terminating on June 30, 2024. In the interim we will cover your animal control needs, but this agreement shall continue on a year to year basis unless terminated by any party hereto as provided below.

9. Amendment:

This agreement may not otherwise be amended or altered without a written, signed, and filed amendment to the agreement executed by the parties hereto.

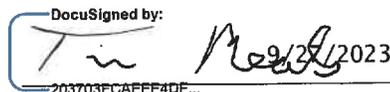

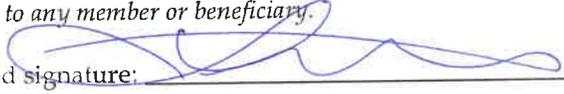

Gleaning and distributing food was initiated in early June. Anecdotal response has been very positive. Short surveys have not yet been made available to food pantries

- **Success stories**

One of this project's objectives is to provide food for both Nevada Food at First meals and for food pantries in Eastern Story County communities by gleaning locally. A retail donation partnership proposal was submitted, accepted, and affirmed by Dollar Fresh (Nevada) management and employees on June 5 and implemented on June 7. Volunteers are now rescuing food that would otherwise be thrown away every morning, seven days a week. Just over two (2) tons of safe and tasty food was made available this month. It has been used to prepare Nevada Food at First meals and distributed to food pantries in Maxwell, Colo, Zearing, and Nevada (Nevada Community Cupboard and Cubbie's Cupboard) to help households be more nutritionally secure.

A new Neighborhood Meal Stop was launched in Colo on June 5. A local resident who lives in the same neighborhood as others receiving meals is regularly making the deliveries. A bunch of bananas equipped this volunteer to make friends with a child from one of the new households. This child will apparently do anything for a banana. In this case, bananas offered a portal for what has already become a meaningful relationship for this volunteer.

OVERALL pounds since ARPA grants were awarded (from November 2022 thru June 2023) = 417,643 pounds

- **Number of sacks of food distributed through the K-5 Backpack program compared to previous years' stats**
3,880 in SY22-23 (vs. 6,752 in SY21-22). The decline in Backpacks distributed in this school year as compared to the previous one was due to Ames CSD discontinuing its participation in the Backpack program. Instead, ACSD now has 3 school-based food pantries, including in 2 of the elementary schools that previously distributed Backpacks (Edwards and Mitchell).

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- **Percentage of surveyed individuals who reported a positive impact of emergency assistance**

98% of those surveyed indicated a positive impact of the emergency food program (249 individuals). 2% of those surveyed were neutral on the impact (4 individuals). 0.4% noted a negative impact (1 individual), but this same individual also checked that the pantry had a “neutral” and “positive” impact – i.e. this survey respondent seems to have misunderstood the question. A total of 252 surveys were conducted at 6 of the funded programs in quarter 4.

- **Demographic information of those served (as available)**

As requested by the Story County Board of Supervisors, below is information on the zip codes of those served by the emergency food programs receiving ARPA funding. This provides evidence that individuals from throughout Story County have benefited from the ARPA dollars.

Of those for whom zip code was known, 40.5% were from Nevada, 39.8% were from Ames zip codes, 8.8% from Maxwell, and the remainder from other communities as indicated. Please note that many of those with “unknown zip code” were homeless at the time of service. Please also note that those served from outside Story County (1.7% of the total in Q4) were typically only served once, at which point the geographical guidelines for service were explained; repeat visitors from outside Story County were typically turned away.

Our regional 211 call center is going through another transition. Per a June 15 email from Renee Miller, Chief Community Impact Officer at United Way of Central Iowa (that had been operating our 211 Call Center): “We are making an operational transition to streamline Iowa services but it will not have any impact on the delivery or quality of service.” She adds, “United Way of the Midlands [in Omaha] will be the primary operating partner for Iowa but it is in partnership with United Way of Central Iowa.” Given this major transition and staffing changes, we were unable to obtain call logs to share a client success story for this quarter.

However, we are happy to share the impact of the distribution of 211 materials countywide. Our contractor, Jenny Schill, reported: “I delivered materials to all of the local libraries and most of the librarians were excited to be getting marketing materials for 211. [...]he Story City Librarian ... said they have never had anyone come in with needs, like homelessness before, until this past year. So she was happy to have materials to give out to people as they are starting to see more people with needs.”

Similarly, a number of churches in the Roland-Story area picked up 211 materials from United Way staff member, Andy Fish, at a spring career fair at Roland-Story High School. They too have seen an increase in requests for assistance and stated they were happy to have a 1-stop spot to which to refer clients for resources.

We thank the Story County Board of Supervisors for the grant award that made it possible to print and share 211 materials broadly.

Overall we have had 7 individuals overall start our training program and 2 engage in working with our staff through one-on-one services. Unfortunately, the 2 that started the one-on-one services did not continue to engage with our services.

During this quarter, unfortunately our training completion rate was 33%. However, overall since starting this initiative our training completion is 71%. We are reaching our 85% completion rate by continue to reach out Story County residents to engage them in services and make sure the training is the correct program for them prior to starting. As we are just beginning this work there, we are confident we will increase these training completion numbers throughout the next year of the project.

Jamie* was fleeing violence and needed a safe place to stay away from the person who caused harm. Our staff were able to provide crisis counseling and safety planning. We were able to get them into shelter. As part of case management, our staff worked with them to apply for Section 8. Our staff also worked with Jamie and a property manager. The property manager was very accommodating, as they understood their victimization was preventing them from having recent rental history since all of the finances were controlled by the perpetrator. With that in mind, the property manager waived the requirement of needing a recent rental record, and worked with us to proceed in letting Jamie apply for an apartment. Jamie was in our shelter for a couple of weeks until the apartment became available. We were able to assist with rent for this client. The timing worked out well for the client, as after our assistance, they were able to find full-time employment and sustain rent on their own.

To date we have gathered feedback on the needs of the kitchen from both our kitchen and childcare staff. We have also been working on possible floor plans/designs and identifying appliances. Ensuring we can best utilize the space to meet the needs of our kitchen now and in the future is our top priority.

Our staff have toured both Ames Community Preschool Center (ACPC) and the Food at First kitchens, both of which have been recently renovated.

We had begun coordinating the bid process. However, we will likely restart this procurement process in the fall.

We know this project will likely exceed the \$178,000 we were awarded for this grant, so have identified additional grant funds to support the full project costs. These funds will be from DHS Stabilization Funds grant.

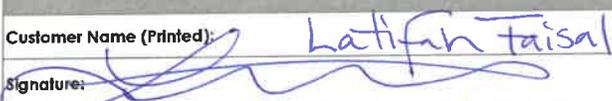

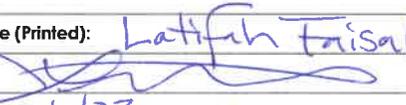
